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# POST-OPERATIVE SHOULDER SURGERY INSTRUCTIONS

#### General:

- Dressings left on for 48 hours after surgery (you can shower as long as the dressing stays dry)
- Brace: if you have a brace, you can remove for ice machine/CPM use
- Diet: you may eat as long as you feel comfortable. You may feel nauseous the first day. There are no restrictions on eating.
- 48 hours after surgery you may:
  - Remove entire dressing
  - Shower and get incisions wet
  - Pat dry and rewrap with gauze and ace wrap or cover with band-aids

# Your sling use and exercises/activity will be determined by the type of procedure that you had done. See checked item(s) below:

# Sling:

- $\Box$  At all times
- $\Box$  As needed for comfort
- $\Box$  4 weeks
- $\Box$  6 weeks

## Exercises:

- $\Box$  None keep arm in sling
- □ Pendulums only
- □ Passive range of motion
- □ Active range of motion as tolerated
- □ No limitations on activity

Please make sure your post-op appointment is made for <u>10-14</u> days after your surgery!

If not, please call 212-241-8892 to schedule

Your shoulder may be painful after surgery. In order to control this pain, see below for medicine that you may take.

Prescription (given day of surgery):

Percocet

 $\rightarrow$  1-2 pills every 4-6 hours as needed for severe pain

Over-the- counter: (**alternate** between the following two medications every 2-3 hours as needed):

# Tylenol (acetaminophen) Extra Strength (500 mg)

- $\rightarrow$  1-2 pills every 6-8 hours as needed for pain
- → DO NOT use if you are taking Vicodin or Percocet (Both contain Tylenol)

## Advil or Motrin 200 mg (or ibuprofen)

 $\rightarrow$  2-3 pills every 6-8 hours as needed for pain

For constipation:

#### Colace 100 mg

 $\rightarrow$  1 pill every 8 hours as needed

#### If you are experiencing any of the following call our office immediately @ 212-241-1815.

 $\Rightarrow$  fever greater than 101.5 degrees F

⇔ chills

- $\Rightarrow$  excessive redness or swelling of incisions
- ⇒ yellow (pus) drainage at incision sites

## Anesthesia:

Some anesthesia drugs you may have received can take up to 24 hours to leave your system completely.



For this reason, you should not ingest any alcoholic beverages, drive a car, operate machinery, or make any important decisions for at least 24 hours after your surgery or while taking pain medication.
